To Pray

To pray means to lean on God; to spend time with Him; to give myself to Him and await His visitation; to put my whole self, with all my failings and my sins, into His mercy and love; to breathe spiritually; to come out of myself and be freed. To rejoice in His presence, to enjoy His glory, to be moved by gratitude for His blessings, to wonder at His creation, to see in man the engraving of His image and in events the seal of His wisdom and love. To bring God into my everyday life and live within His kingdom; to contemplate in Christ unceasingly, both when one works and when one sleeps... This is possible. All this can be attempted and become an aim. That is the worst thing – for this natural path of prayer to be considered an exaggeration. (Metropolitan Nikolaos of Mesogaia and Lavreotiki)

The Author of Life

I think of God, the maker of all things, both visible and invisible, when I see His handiwork. According to our faith, He is indeed, the "Author of Life". This phrase appears in the second part of the anaphora prayer from St. Basil's liturgy. We proclaim it in more detail with the recitation or singing of Psalm 104 at vespers:

O Lord, how manifold are Thy works! In wisdom hast Thou made them all; the earth is full of Thy creatures. Yonder is the sea, great

and wide, which teems with things innumerable, living things both small and great.

We cannot know God's Essence, but we can and do know Him through His energies and

activities. So, when we notice the details of the physical world, we see what God has done and still does in sustaining it all. Great art Thou O Lord and marvelous are Thy works! teach and inspire us through our relationships with these special creatures that He puts into our lives. Tenderness, compassion, patience, faithfulness and responsibility are standouts for me. It's telling that even

Living things both small and great display the qualities God placed in them. We see immense beauty in nature, as well as harmony and variety - power and gentleness. Our relationship with other creatures is set forth in chapter one of Genesis. We who are made in the image and likeness of God are to have "dominion" over them. We got to "name" them. But our dominion is not to be tyrannical, cruel or totally self- serving. We are rather to be good stewards of God's creation. We are to cultivate and care for

living things and they serve us and our needs. For centuries, this was lived out in the form of flocks, herds and harvests. Ones wealth and status was often measured by this.

Of late, in wealthier nations (ours included) our relationship with some creatures has become a bit more personal. We have "pets". Creatures who, for the most part, we've chosen to invite into our lives and homes. And unlike those in the wild, these now directly depend on us and our care for survival. Bonds form with them and they

become, in a way, part of our family. Such is the case with this little Corgi puppy in the picture.

Although we've only known her for a few months, she's brought joy and comfort to us all. God continues to



teach and inspire us through our relationships with these special creatures that He puts into our lives. Tenderness, compassion, patience, faithfulness and responsibility are standouts for me. It's telling that even in scripture, the model between shepherd and sheep is used by our Lord to help us understand His love for us and our relationship with Him. He is the Good Shepherd who cares for His flock, and each is precious to Him even when they go astray. This carries over into our understanding of family, children and of priest and parish as well.

And, as I've learned, a pet can even inspire the writing of a newsletter article. Thanks, Thorgi!

RUNNING THE RACE

During the years that I have been writing to you, discussing my aches and pains and how they bring me closer to, or move me further from God, I never thought that I would write an article about my breast cancer. Surprise! I won't be this time around either. Although my breast cancer is a huge reality in my life, in so many ways charting



my daily course, motivating my thoughts and directing my actions, I am still not able to comprehend it.

I have a place in the back of the church and from it I have often had an opportunity to perform vital church tasks. I can adjust the heat and AC, monitor the weather on procession days and Christmas Eve (seeking very different conditions), run down to check the flame under soup and witness the flow of gentle foot traffic that characterizes parish life where there are people actually present to worship.

Because, it is sadly true that there are lots of places, and even times in our own parish where there are not crowds, or presence or children exchanging books and crayons. At those times I am grateful that we are "surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses" (Hebrew 12:1) represented on our adorned walls and latticework screen and present with us, strengthening us for each struggle.

Yet, when all the constituent parts work together; i.e., the traffic, the weather, the soccer schedules, the car batteries, the work responsibilities, the constant needs of others, then a loving dialogue goes on in this place. We stand. We sit. We sing. We serve. We care for one another. We uphold one another. We pray for one another. We strive together. It is not always a rosy picture. It is rarely easy (I confess, though I don't recommend it, that a life

threatening disease does add a certain sharper meaning to many of our prayers), but it is ours and these actions work to bring us closer to the living God.

There are days when we feel just plain frustrated. As if we are spinning on a wheel. And some days we are. There are obstacles and noise. Interruptions poke at us and distract us. And there is the ongoing challenge to faith, the nagging wondering about the relevance of worship. When we battle the "other things" we have to do, we set a priority and honor the God that we ask to watch over us, to protect us, to guide us, to help us to do well on exams, or blood work. Even when we are

broken we are capable of thanksgiving.

This past Sunday was the Sunday of All Saints. We read from Hebrews 12:1-2,

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance that race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God."

I am so grateful to be in that cloud of witnesses, so crowded sometimes that St. Seraphim of Sarov had to bat away angels. But I am also, and each day, so grateful to be among these witnesses, the saints of Saint Mark Orthodox Church. Each in your, and our, own way making that effort to keep the eyes on Christ, and run with perseverance that race, as personal and challenging as it is, that is set before us.







SENIORS!!






