Who Makes a Saint?

During this season of Covid, we've experienced the loss of several long time members of our parish - John Petro, Sunny Holovak and Alice Krenitsky. All of whom had made great and good efforts to establish and maintain St. Mark. Most recently after the announcement of Alice's passing, a number of people shared their thoughts and condolences. One message however particularly caught my attention. It simply said: "She's a saint." Having known her


and been her Father Confessor for 20 years, I understood. It wasn't that there was an icon of her in church, or a day upon which hymns written to commemorate her were sung. It was more a

harkening back to the use of the term "saint" in the early church. St. Paul sometimes referred to the community of believers in a given city as "the saints".

We are all called to be saints, but how does that actually happen? Often people assume that a committee of church officials or bishops somewhere simply proclaims a person to be a saint. This is only partly correct. Another way of looking at it though could be that since God created all people, He makes saints. Some could say that mothers and fathers make saints in as much as they raise their children in the Church and train them in faith and piety. So in this

way, the community or context of a person's life encourages saintly belief and behavior. It could be argued that the foundation of sanctity in a person's life is a cooperative endeavor between that person's human will and God's grace. Setting aside theology though, what we are talking about here is Godly and virtuous behavior. When a person takes seriously the command of Christ to love God with all of one's heart, soul, mind and strength, and exhibits love

of neighbor as self, it shows. And in a way, all of the above is true. God creates us to be saints, we are introduced to faith in Christ by those around us and nurtured in it by the Holy C h u r c h.

But what we do on Sundays and the awareness of it needs to realign us for the week ahead. In the Church Sunday begins the new week. In modern jargon it front loads our week. How do we both live that and honor it?



Taking Sundays off from the tasks that have sometimes consumed my mom and me has helped me to stand outside of the constant to do list and remember the One to whom we will all answer.

In the Orthodox Church we see everything through the lens of the light of Christ. Sunday is not "the Christian Sabbath". It is the 8th day and the 1st day. The Lord's Day. Every Sunday is a Resurrection Sunday. Every feast day draws us back to the integral value of a life in Christ,

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a life with Christ. Sunday is not the exclamation point of our week, punctuated by pork roast dinner and football. It is the beginning of the new week, where we once again meet the Lord at the chalice (or on-line) and strengthen ourselves in the walk to the kingdom.

To do this I have to pause from some of those other cares. It is necessary for me to take a break from chores and remember who I am and Who I work for. Thank you to my mother for reminding me of this. Come join my mom and me in not doing laundry on The Lord's Day. You will love it.
